The skills learnt were not easy, but that's the point! Our students built skills in all of the above areas, and maybe took home a new hobby which they can continue to practise.

On Friday of Week 2, we got a visit from Scott Griffin. Scott taught us different circus tricks, some tricks we learnt were juggling, flower sticks and stilt walking. Our class found the stilt walking the most difficult, because it was challenging to balance while standing on them. We had a mixture of people enjoying the flower sticks or juggling more. We enjoyed these tricks because we had to use our hand-eye co-ordination and it was fun to get to throw items into the air. - Upper Primary Class
