### From the Principal

Dear Families,

It's hard to believe we're already halfway through Term 2! The past few weeks have been full of rich learning experiences and strong community connection. From excursions and storytelling to sport and cultural learning, our students continue to grow in confidence and capability.

Alongside our ongoing focus on explicit teaching, our staff are also refining their responsive teaching practices to better support all learners. This includes more targeted instruction and purposeful consolidation during reading lessons, as well as enrichment of learning through increased peer-to-peer dialogue.

In Mathematics, this looks like students being encouraged to articulate their thinking-explaining not just what they did, but why. This kind of metacognitive practice helps students build deeper understanding and take greater ownership of their learning. When students are supported to reflect on their thinking and engage in dialogue with their peers, they develop critical reasoning skills, clarify their ideas, and grow as confident learners.

A big thank you to our families for your continued support-it really does make a difference. We're especially looking forward to our Centenary Celebration of Learning in Week 8 and hope to see many of you there.

## **Centenary Celebration – week 8**


We're very excited to celebrate 100 years of Kongorong Primary School in its current building!

## **Upper Primary Learning**

As part of our writing unit, we have been reading Uncle Xbox by Jared Thomas. Students have been focusing on enhancing their writing by adding descriptive language to make their sentences more engaging and interesting for the reader. They have also been learning about the importance of chronological order to improve the sequence and flow of their narratives.

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## PE – Gymnastics

Over three energetic weeks, students from Preschool to Year 6 thoroughly enjoyed their gymnastics program at Blue Lake Gymnastics. Each session saw students rotate through a variety of floor, bar, and ring activities, all designed to develop balance, coordination, and strength.

A highlight was learning special gymnastics stances—especially the much-loved 'motorbike' landing (ask your child to show you!). With lots of smiling faces and growing confidence, it was a fantastic opportunity to build fundamental movement skills in a fun and supportive environment.



# Science

In science class this term the Junior Primary students have been experimenting with a variety of materials to discover which ones best enable flying, sliding, and floating. They have designed, constructed and flown kites, paper planes and wind mills; tested a variety of objects to see if they sink or float; and slid things down the slide to see which ones worked best. The children learned through play when dressing up in clothes made of different fabrics, and acting out the story of the 'Three Little Pigs' with the different construction materials.

The Upper Primary Class has been focussing on the state of matter. They have conducted experiments with dissolving to create solutions and suspensions; melted ice using a variety of substances; condensed water from the air; changed sugar from a solid to a liquid and back again using heat; and created a substance called 'oobleck', which is neither solid nor liquid. The students have studied the way the molecules change their behaviour when heated or cooled and drawn scientific diagrams of this concept.





## Kindergarten news

We have had a busy few weeks. Some of the highlights have included: -Story tables for "The Very Hungry Caterpillar", and Mr Brown's Magnificent Apple Tree have been used frequently.

Investigation tables - Sensory play with peas and beans.

Our days have been filled with enthusiastic exploring and investigating various sea creatures and things we might see on the beach. I recently found a shark egg and we found a matching picture to identify it, in the Department of Environment's Explorer's guide. This led onto to finding out about things we might see on a beach. The Landscape Board of SA have a wonderful beach combing field guide to help identify what you might see on the beach. There were many opportunities for curiosity and learning different words. We learnt that some things on the beach



shouldn't be touched and could be hazardous. In the coming weeks we will be exploring more about eggs and the animals or minibeasts that produce them. This will be our next investigation table to encourage children's learning dispositions and curiosity.

We hope everyone enjoyed our puppet performance to "Slippery Fish" this week. The children used their creativity to draw and construct their interpretations of the main characters in the song. If you would like to revisit this song with your child to re-enact at home, you will find it on YouTube.



# Noorla Yo-Long

Our Upper Primary students recently took part in a challenging and rewarding day at Noorla Yo-Long, where they tackled a variety of high ropes activities designed to stretch both body and mind. The high ropes course presented a series of individual and teambased challenges, requiring students to draw on courage, focus, and persistence. There were moments of nervousness and hesitation—but just as many of determination, encouragement, and celebration. It was fantastic to see students supporting one another, cheering on their peers, and pushing themselves outside their comfort zones.
